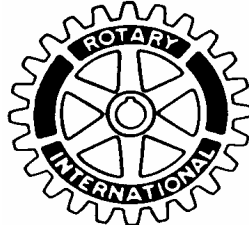

July 16, 2001 Meeting Summary

President Wilson Hayman called the meeting to order. Paul Briggs gave the invocation, led the pledge of allegiance, welcomed and recognized guests and visiting Rotarians and announced make-ups.

Announcements:

Chuck Caldwell announced that the Carolina Mudcats baseball outing will be on July 21. The Raleigh Rescue Mission will supply transportation for the youth that the Club will chaperone and host. Rotarians are to be at the Stadium at 5:00pm. Please contact Chuck if you can attend and assist with this worthwhile service opportunity.

Willard Ross provided a volunteer opportunity. The Poe Center for Health Education will be holding "Ready, Set, Poe" in Cameron Village on Saturday, August 11th, beginning at 4:30pm. Brochures about the 5K race and Family Fun Festival were on each table. Please contact Willard if you can volunteer.

The President thanked members for the excellent record of having all members current with their dues. Invoices are out for the quarter and are due by July 31st. He called members attention to the Bulletin supplement on each table that lists four prospective new members as recommended by the Membership and Classifications Committees and approved by the Board of Directors:

If no written objections to the nomination, stating reasons, is received by the Board from any member of the Club within seven days following the publication of the name, the prospective new member will be considered elected to the membership of the Rotary Club of Raleigh.

President Wilson gave a "Rotary Moment" on his visit last week to Rotary International Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois where he attended as session with other presidents of large clubs. He called members' attention to the recent edition of *The Rotarian* magazine and encouraged us to read about goals for the year built on the International Theme "Mankind is our Business".

Program:

Robert McMillan gave a warm and personal introduction of our speaker and his long time friend, Sheriff John Baker. He noted the Sheriff is a Raleigh native who grew up in the Oberlin community, is a N. C. Central University alumnus and had a successful NFL career. Sheriff Baker began his remarks by emphasizing the importance of law enforcement—that it is the protection of life and property and critical to the high quality of life enjoyed in Wake County. He noted that the municipalities, as well as the Sheriff's Department, have fine professional law enforcement personnel who are on the job 7 days a week, 24 hours a day protecting the over 600,000 citizens across Wake County's 856 square miles. Sheriff Baker has been in office for 23 years and leads a department with over 500 men and women and a \$34 million budget. He discussed the enforcement

and detention responsibilities of the Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff said 99% of the persons in county custody are charged but not yet convicted and stated his firmly held belief that everyone be treated as human beings. He noted the Department answers calls outside of the corporate town and city limits and serves the over 165,000 persons who live in the unincorporated area of the County. The Sheriff also has responsibility for serving legal documents throughout the County. He noted his special concern for young people and emphasized the importance of discipline starting in the home to keep young persons on the right track. Sheriff Baker concluded his remarks by saying he is proud to be elected by the people and serve the citizens of Wake County.

President Wilson Hayman thanked our speaker, Sheriff Baker, and all visitors; reminded everyone of next week's meeting at the BTI Center with speaker Roger Krupa; and, adjourned the meeting.
